

The Two Faces of Lewis Carroll

Abstract: - *In this paper, we show that Lew is Carroll, author of several children's works, was a drug abuser. His main work, Alice in Wonderland is built on the foundation of a Magic Mushroom experience and the associated flashbacks. His biography by Cohen does not mention this dual personality of the esteemed author. The imagery and characters he uses leave no doubt that he was an experienced drug user.*

Introduction

When I was five years old, my parents put me at my cousins. I was a shy little boy and they thought being out would help me adjust for school the next year. My cousin Mark, who was six in September, brought LSD home from the school yard -St Joseph's school in the city center. Because he was jealous of me and sickly, he positioned me with LSD. When my aunt found out, she called the hospital emergency which instructed her to get me some sleeping pills. She left me and my younger cousin Matthew in the house while she and her youngest went to the local pharmacy to pick up sleeping pills. When she returned, she gave me the sleeping pills. I recall asking her if I was going to die? She said, "I don't think so." That was my first LSD trip. I had no experience of it until I had flash backs at night when I was going to school at St Peter's.

My second trip on LSD involved a Grateful Dead concert. Me and the boys went to one of their concerts at a racetrack in rural Maine. I don't know why I decided to take the drug. It was a bad trip. It frightened me to death.

My third and final trip on LSD (which incidentally stands for Lucifer, Satan, and the devil) was at another Grateful Dead concert in Foxborough Massachusetts. An acquaintance poisoned me with an entire vile of LSD which he put in a cup of beer that he so generously offered me. I didn't realize we were enemies.

An adventure with LSD is a trip into the subconscious. There are body distortions, auditor

hallucinations, disappearing acts, Teeth chattering, dancing, and images of reptiles and lions. I was enlightened to discover that the human mind functions on a frequency that if interrupted, cause temporary annihilation of the self. The frequency of the mind must match the frequency of the universe which is $1/\pi$. I also discovered that each person is another person's "show".

The frequency is crucial to understand AT Math. Interesting that Lewis Carroll, who was a drug user, also understood AT Math. Drug use is common among writers. Indeed, Carroll writes about food and drink as "Eat Me" and "Drink me." It wasn't labelled as poison.

I could write a piece about Lewis Carroll and his drug use as it is revealed in Alice in Wonderland which is a storey about an LSD trip. Carroll used Cocaine, Cannabis, and Opium. The natural form of LSD d (discovered in 1936) was Magic Mushrooms, called Shrooms. Pepper is the English word for the Greek word Intoxicant. Pepper makes you sneeze. So does Cocaine.

Carroll doesn't hide the drug paraphernalia, in this case the hootcha which is a water pipe used for smoking opium. A form of Opium was available in 19th Century England called Laudanum.

On LSD trips one sees reptiles and rats. The various characters in Alcice in Wonderland are Lizards; Turtles, Snakes, Frogs, and crocodiles. Rats are sometimes seen on a bad trip.

Body distortions come with flash backs. I recall lying in bad when I was a boy, and I experiences body

distortions. Your feet fell like they are miles away and you could never reach them. Clothes draped over a banister become lions and hippopotami.

Auditory hallucinations allowed me to hear the radio in my ear at night when everyone was asleep.

The White Rabbit in Alice of Wonderland referred to Cocaine. Cocaine, of course is a white powder. The reference to rabbits is that are fecund. Although I've never tried it, Cocaine is said to stir risky promiscuity.

Carroll was also a pedophile -taking pictures of little girls in the nude. He wrote that he spent 75% of his time thinking of little girls. Everything he did was to set up encounters with little girls by themselves.

There must be a personality pathology that some souls who are pedophiles are also drug abusers. Take Michael Jackson for example. Or Premier Richard Hatfield.

The disappearing Cath with the grin is also in the show. It disappears. Its also grins because it inhales the smoke from cannabis.

This device of a baby becoming a pig refers to the devil. He has a pig nose, and a pig face. The card game popular in England where it was likely created as the rules were published there in the 17th Century refer to Cribbage. The game is referred to Crib. Card suits are of equal value in Cribbage.

Alice carried in her pocket Comfit- which is a sweet candy. Candy is a nickname for LSD.

Carroll was the Cook who used a lot of pepper in her cooking. Pepper is an intoxicant. The Cat was high on the second-hand smoke of the cannabis. The Caterpillar smoked opium from a water pipe. Opium makes one sleepy. The White Rabbit uses cocaine. There character may all be Carroll himself enchanting Alice.

There are a couple of references to Alice being lost. This is a common experience among the LSD trip. Also, a certain understanding comes with LSD trips, although I don't recommend its use.

Lewis Carroll confesses to his double life in the opening pages of Alice in Wonderland. Note:

She generally gave herself good advice (though she very seldom followed it), and sometimes she scolded herself so severely as to bring tears to her eyes.for this curious child was very fond of pretending to be two people. "But it's no use now to pretend to be two people! Why there is hardly enough of me left to make one respectable person." Lewis is confessing about himself which he was want to do.

Lewis knew about the General Judgment of the Great with Throne from the Bible. He knew that the IDOL of the Oppressor would be installed on April 3, 2005 = 3, 4, 5.

In Alice of Wonderland He refers to the March Hare. March is 03. Then he writes:

The Hatter looked at the March Hare, who had followed him into the court, arm-in-arm with the Dormouse. "Fourteenth of March, I think it was, he said.

"Fifteenth" said the March Hare.

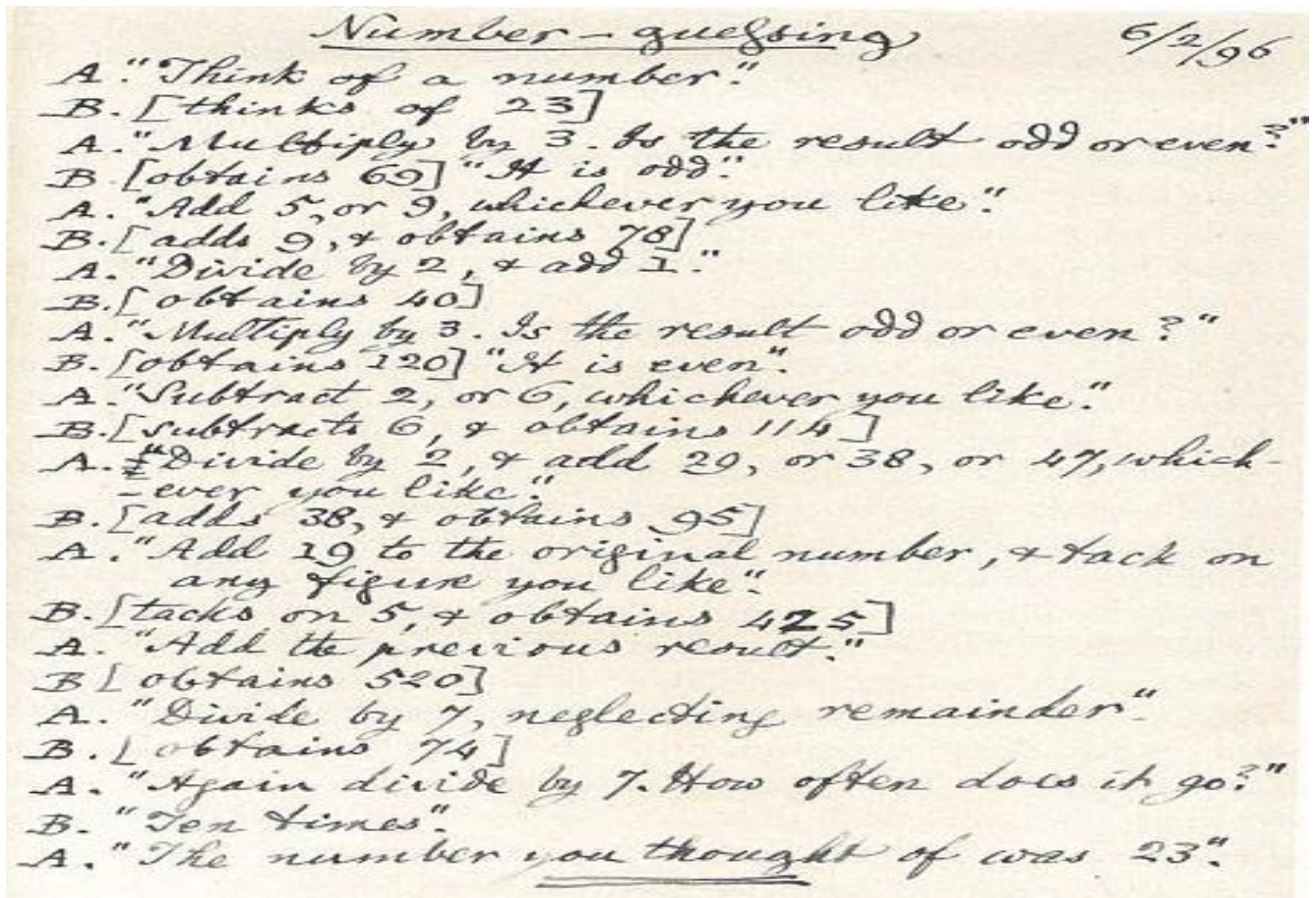
"Sixteenth" added the Dormouse. {1} pg 99

The average of 14, 15, and 16 is 45

This is April 3, 2005 -the date the Idol was installed.

Now as for the number saved, it is 23 -including the 11 Apostles, St Paul, St Joachim, the Seven Great intercessors (don't double count St Jude); The Sacred Heart, and Br Leo, Br Anthony and Br Paul. This adds to 23 people saved.

Now Lewis used that number in a puzzle.



It is possible that Carroll knew about the General Judgement that took place at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Saint John, NB.

Carroll writes in *Through the Looking Glass*:

"Why his time is worth a thousand pounds a minute."

Further on:

"The land there is worth a thousand pounds an inch."

And,

"Why the smoke alone is worth a thousand pounds a puff."

Finally,

"Language is worth a thousand pounds a word!" Pg 196

The first two refer to time and space. The third refers to a puff of Hashish. Time and space are distorted under the influence of smoking hash.

Magic Mushrooms leave one with a sense of being lost - can't find their way around. Carroll writes:

"I was in a wood just now - and I wish I could get back there!" pg 198.

"...ask them the way out of the wood." pg 206

"Would you tell me which road leads out of the wood?" pg 209

An experience of being on LSD is the realization that we are all part of another person's "show". Carroll writes:

"I do hope it's my dream, and not the Red King's. I don't like belonging to another person's dream. Pg 257.

Conclusion

Lewis Carroll led a double life. On the one hand, he was an Oxford lecturer in Mathematics and a Deacon in the Anglican Church. On the other, he was a drug abuser and a pedophile. LSD opened up Lewis Carroll to write one of the most popular children's stories of all time. LSD opened his mind to *AT Math*, and mine as well.
